

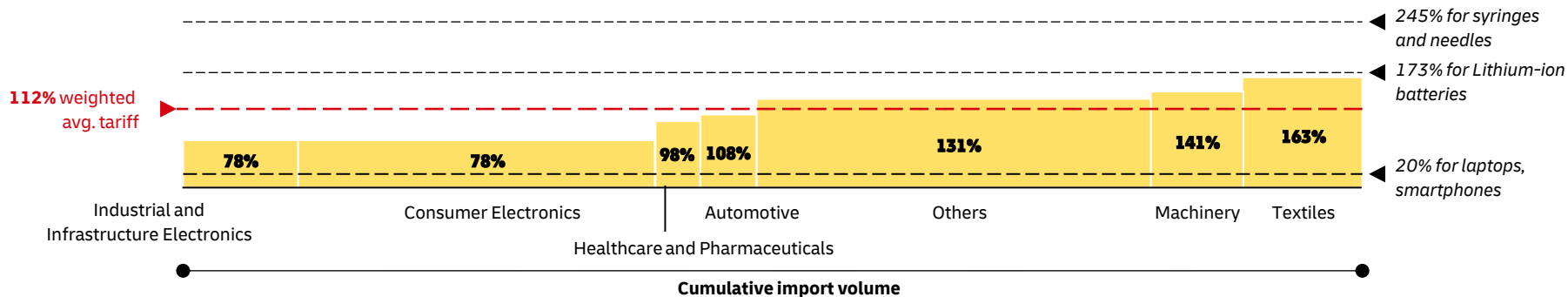

## CURRENT STATUS OF THE TARIFF SITUATION

### → Tariffs on U.S. imports from China by import volume<sup>1</sup> (2024)



U.S. tariffs on Chinese imports consist of four key components:

1. **Product-specific base tariffs** established prior to 2025 (Section 301, HS-code),
2. **20% “fentanyl” tariff** imposed in response to the flow of fentanyl into the U.S. (under IEEPA),
3. **125% “reciprocal tariff”** aimed at rebalancing the bilateral trade relationship (IEEPA), and
4. **additional product-specific exemptions** (e.g., smartphones)

**De-minimis removal** for imported goods that are valued at or under 800 USD are now also subject to applicable duties:

Option 1: 120% ad valorem duty rate or Option 2: 200 USD duty per postal item

**NOTE:** Tariffs are subject to changes and influenced by ongoing geopolitical developments, bilateral trade agreements, and industry-specific negotiations between countries and trade bodies.
